IS WORLD PEACE POSSIBLE?

That’s the question Paul Chappell will be responding to in his 7:00pm talk November 17th at the Landmark Center, St. Paul.



Obviously, the MAP community believes peace is possible; else its members wouldn’t continue to work for it. But, it isn’t easy. The U.S. wages wars without end; the costs are insanely enormous as the war machine rolls on. It has to stop. But, when and how?

Paul Chappell’s answers to those question came out of his West Point training and Iraq war experiences. Along side himself, he believes strongly that most of those who have experienced the horrors of war can and must be allies in ending war.

Chappell’s appearance gives **us** an opportunity to ask him questions like these (if they don’t get answered in his speech).

1. How can we challenge deeply imbedded beliefs that “wars are inevitable, necessary and beneficial” without getting into heated, alienating arguments?
2. What are some strategies for building the groundswell needed for shifting our current military paradigm to an alternative one? And, what might that alternative look like?
3. For groups or nations at war, or close to war, what international body can and should intervene to stop or prevent war? Can the U.N. do it? (Joe Schwartzberg is one of the world’s leading advocates for U.N. reforms that could meet that goal. His article is below.)
4. In general, what is your opinion of the peacemaking community’s effectiveness in waging peace, and how could they do better?

As conscientious and hardworking as MAP members are, there’s always more our combined membership could do to wage peace.

What the United Nations Could and Should Do To Prevent War

Since individual nations tend to respond to requests for peacekeeping assistance in terms of what they deem to be in their own national interest, what is needed is a standing, internationally recruited, rapidly deployable, elite all-volunteer UN Peace Force under direct UN command.

Additionally, we need a highly trained UN Administrative Reserve Corps (UNARC) to restore a degree of normalcy in areas where peacekeeping missions have had some success.

Detailed descriptions of how such institutions, as well as of a UN Administrative Academy where UNARC staff would be trained) are provided in my book, *Transforming the United Nations System: Designs for a Workable World*, published by the United Nations University Press in 2013. The work can be purchased through Amazon or the Brookings Institution Press.

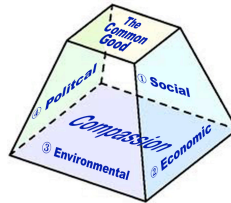
